Mental health activists and practitioners across the country work to reduce the prevalence of suicide and provide support to those who struggle. Suicide Prevention Week and Month provides an opportunity for open hearts and minds to begin having vulnerable conversations. It is a time to educate ourselves, support the people in our lives, and take action to reduce suicide rates on a mass scale.

Statistics about Suicide:

The statistics on suicide are disheartening and can be overwhelming, nonetheless, they reveal a big picture of the issue at hand.

- 1n 2020, suicide was the 12th leading cause of death overall in the U.S., claiming over 49,500 lives.
- Rates of suicide are highest among male Native Americans, at 37.4% per 100,000.
- The #1 method of suicide is the use of firearms, 57.9% of males and 33% of females.
- Suicide is the #1 cause of gun deaths in the U. S., at 60.3% of the number of gun deaths by intent.
- LGBTQ youth are 4x more likely to attempt suicide than their peers.
- Between 2007 and 2018, suicide rates among those age 10-24 increased by nearly 60%.

THE LOST ARE JUST AS IMPORTANT

I thank the Lord for the opportunity to share with each of you a portion of His word, and I pray that this devotion encourages you to share the gospel with those in this world. Anytime I have the opportunity to share the Word of God with others is a blessing, and it is my prayer that those who are lost come to know Jesus as their Lord and Savior. One passage that comes to mind when typing up this devotion is Luke 15. In this chapter of Luke's gospel are three parables that deal with the lost and what our response to them should be as Christians. As Jesus was preaching to the sinners and tax collectors, the Pharisees were off to the side condemning Jesus for preaching the good news to those who were not living according to God's word. Jesus responded by telling three parables: the parable of the lost sheep, the parable of the lost coin, and the parable of the two sons. In each of these three parables there was something lost, something found, and a celebration that took place when that which was lost was found. In our society we have a bunch of people who are like the Pharisees in this passage, who look down upon those who are lost in sin and believe it is beneath them to be a witness. At one time I had a negative outlook on those who were in jail, but since the Lord dealt with me on this issue, my heart breaks for those who are lost. Also, sometimes a person has a point of acting like the older brother getting jealous because they are not getting more attention than those who have come to Christ. As a Christian we should celebrate each time a person gets saved because this is one less soul that has to spend eternity separated from God. The Lost are just as important as those who are saved. Read Luke 15 and be blessed.
