Saint Patrick

Maewyn Succat (St. Patrick) was born during the 5th century to a Christian family in Britain. His family was considered wealthy, as his father was a tax collector. At the age of 16 Maewyn was kidnapped by a band of raiders who brought him to Ireland to be sold him as a slave. For 6 yrs, he spent much of his time in isolation, without proper food or clothing, herding cows and sheep for local chieftains. He says an angel appeared to him in a dream and told him of a ship leaving Ireland, so he walked across 200 miles of peat bogs and forest to arrive at a port bound for the European continent. He returned to his family in Britain, and after a period of religious training, he was ordained as a deacon. He was later consecrated as a bishop and given the name Patricius (Patrick). As providence would have it, Patrick requested an assignment back to Ireland to serve as a missionary and is credited with bringing the Christian faith to the Irish people. Today, he is known as the Patron Saint of Ireland and is Ireland's national apostle.

The complimentary event for people with special needs is hosted by local churches and takes place simultaneously around the world on the same date each year.

This year several BRC individuals from the Brookhaven/Wesson area took advantage of this special event and enjoyed activities like: a red-carpet entrance, complete with cheering fans and paparazzi-style photographers; hair, make up, nail, and shoe-shine stations; limousine rides; a host of games, dancing, karaoke and even a visit from "Love", the golden retriever from Canines 4 Christ. All honored guest also had the opportunity to enjoy a delicious catered meal. Each person received a boutonniere or corsage upon arrival and a crown or tiara during the crowning ceremony.

As each guest & staff arrived onto the scene, they were formally greeted, given King and Queen name tags, and paired with a "Buddy", a volunteer who had undergone stringent background testing, to accompany them as guests participated in all the activities their hearts desired. Afterwards, caregivers and family members were invited to relax in their very own respite area, where they could enjoy their own night of pampering, complete with a delicious, catered meal, games, and door prizes. They also heard from guest speaker, Miss Mississippi, whose platform advocates for more ID/DD-inclusive curriculum in Mississippi's public schools, a cause that's dear to heart through a brother who lives with physical disabilities. In the respite lounge, there were two very large TV screens that allowed family members and caregivers to keep watch over their loved ones in the next room, giving them the assurance they needed while being separated.

The amount of preparation and attention to detail that went into making this night a success is impossible to convey through words or even pictures. Everything was "Top Notch" and definitely a night our individuals will never forget. Thank you to everyone who participated in and took the initiative to get our ladies and gentlemen registered and ready for this exciting night.
