#### Cindy Errington named 2021 Employee of the Year

Cindy Errington, a nurse described as "one of the most caring employees at Boswell," was selected top employee of the year for 2021 in Boswell's quarterly recognition program.

She received a cash award from Boswell's Friends and Family Association, an engraved award and personalized parking space.

Cindy's nomination form contained accolades from supervisors to peers with statements that included:

"Cindy is the ideal professional. Her work ethic is impeccable. She works long shifts and occasionally even until 10 p.m., caring for and providing medications to our individuals, and never complains."



Cindy Errington couldn't hold back the tears as she was called onstage to receive her Employee of the Year award.

Her supervisor added, "Cindy's rapport with one of the unit's individuals has motivated him to improve greatly from being wheelchair bound to walking. She tells him, 'Hold your head up,' 'Stand up straight,' and brags on him when he does well. She takes another on daily walks to feed the ducks. She frequently uses her calm caring demeanor to deescalate critical behaviors and outbursts."

Cindy is devoted to her church and possesses a strong faith in God that guides her outstanding character. She practices the "Golden Rule" of treating everyone with respect and doing unto others as she would like to be treated. She is called "a role model for all of us as far as her work ethic, Christian character, compassion and advocacy for our individuals."

Cindy has worked at Boswell for six years and credits her "Fairway team" for helping her excel.

"I would not be able to do my job in the way I feel it should be done if not for my supervisors and co-workers," she said. "Knowing that I have their support and knowing Boswell supports those of us that care for individuals makes me even more determined to do the best possible job that I can."
