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Spotlight on Vicki Kettleman

Vicki Kettleman was born a few davs after Christmas 1965 to Dennis and Emma Jean McKee. She grew up the middle child of three. Her childhood was spent on the family farm which was homesteaded when pioneers settled Mississippi. She graduated from high school in 1983 as Valedictorian. Her high school and early college years were spent aspiring to be an artist but she soon discovered the Psychology Field. She obtained Bachelors (1987) and Masters (1988) Degrees in Educational Psychology from Mississippi State University.

She spent several years working for Mississippi Department of Education as a Psychometrist in the Learning Resource Centers located in Starkville, MS and Gulfport, MS. Next, she began working as a Psychometrist for Hancock County Schools. During this time, she be-

came a mother to two sons, Cole and Quade Stadalis, who are the light of her life. After a change in Administration of the school district, that position was struck from the budget and the district went to Contractual Services. Real estate sales provided a break from the political environment of the school systems, but due to a stagnant market and not having a flair for sales, that lasted only about two years. She returned to college to study pharmacy and obtained a Bachelors Degree in Pharmaceutical Science.

A lack of motivation for a career behind a drug counter prevented further progress in that field. During her stint in Pharmacy School, she married her current husband, Joey Kettleman, rooting her in central Mississippi. Vicki began working at UMC as a Psychometrist gathering Neurological Data for medical studies. When these studies were completed, she began working at Mississippi School for the Deaf as a Psychologist for four years. She then spent about two years at home, enjoying time with her family but after her eldest son graduated high school and the youngest moved to his father's house, she obtained a job at Boswell Regional Center working as a Behavioral Health Specialist for Oak Brook. She quickly fell in love with the beautiful campus, the wonderful people she works with and the ladies on the unit. She has changed positions to be the QIDP for the unit and finds the work very challenging. However, it has been the most rewarding job she has ever had the privilege of working.

Boswell Artists Receive Awards At the 29th Annual Goodwill

Each spring for 29 years, the Jackson, MS Goodwill Industries partnered with VSA (founded by the Kennedy's at the same time as Special Olympics), has called for art from artists with disabilities. The artists are invited to enter their work in an exhibit which has been held at venues such as Veteran's Hospital, the Mississippi Arts Center, Madison Square Center for the Arts, and this year at Jackson Prep High School. Cash prizes, totaling more than \$2,000 in Professional, Nonprofessional, and Student categories, are awarded. All artwork is for sale, but unfortunately could only be purchased this year at the awards ceremony and reception on March 26 from 2:00-4:00 P.M. The competition is always open to all artists with disabilities in Mississippi. Some artists have intellectual disabilities, while others have physical limitations. Some have both. We have been told that the margin between professional and non-professional is narrowing every year as all our artists are improving. The disabilities have definitely challenged these artists, but have not prevented them from producing very high quality, skilled work. Each artist may enter only one piece of art. Boswell entered 14 pieces of art by the following artists: B. Landrum, W. Tslepsis, Sandra, E.M. Thomas, A. Thornhill, R. Woods, T. Cliburn, K. Loggins, D. Howell, D. Robertson, M. Keyes, E. Mingo, C. Roberts, and D. Herrington. This art was representative of a wide spectrum of ability among our artists on campus, and in the community, covering artists who are or have recently been involved in Expressive Arts in Magee, Wesson, and Brookhaven.

D. Jackson, former soloist and Boswell Expressive Hearts Choir participant residing in BRC Wesson Group Home, was invited by Dave Hollingsworth, CEO of Goodwill Industries, to sing three songs for the Awards Ceremony and was very well received. **Many** people spoke to him afterward to express how much his presentation blessed them. Since he is so far away from the campus from which the choir operates, Mr. Jackson now presents concert programs of his own at assisted living facilities and churches as often as he is invited, accompanied by Claire Bevell, Expressive Hearts Choir director. He is able to have piano and voice lessons with Claire each Wednesday in space provided at Wesson Baptist Church. The church family there has adopted Mr. Jackson and enjoys having him join them for Wednesday night dinners and Bible Study where he often sings, and always shares his prayer requests (and menu suggestions). Occasionally, Mr. Loggins is able to join the BRC choir for a performance when we are able to work out logistics. We are expecting him join us for the

Mr. Loggins is exceptionally talented and has won many awards for his work. Sandra resides at Pinelake Geriatric Unit in Magee and has enjoyed several private art sessions with Claire Bevell. Though Sandra requires physical support from Claire to steady her hand, she is able to select her colors and control her own paint brush to complete her very personal and beautiful artwork.

The clients and staff who attended the ceremony and reception all seemed to enjoy the event. It was attended by R. Woods, T. Cliburn, D. Jackson, K. Loggins, D. Howell, D. Robertson and their staff.

Many matted works of art by Boswell artists are kept for future exhibits in the Expressive Arts Classroom at the WAC and are always for sale. Mr. Vinson also expressed he worked alongside his father when starting the operation in the early to late 1970's. Mr. Vinson's duties include installing and adjusting printing plates, loading and feeding paper, mixing inks, controlling ink flow, and ensuring the quality of the final printed materials such as post cards and business cards for varies advertisements. In Planet In Rebellion, George Vandeman wrote: "It was May 21, 1946. The place - Los Alamos. A young and daring scientist was carrying out a necessary experiment in preparation for the atomic test to be conducted in the waters of the South Pacific atoll at Bikini. "He had successfully performed such an experiment many times before. In his effort to determine the amount of U-235 necessary for a chain reaction--scientists call it the critical mass--he would push two hemispheres of uranium together. myself It was only too true. Nine days later he died in agony. Isa 53:5 But he *was* wounded for our transgressions, *he was* bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace *was* upon him; and with his stripes we are healed.
