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Spotlight on: David Tedford



Young David Tedford the year he was elected "Most Handsome" at Magee High School.

David Tedford was born in Glendale, California, the son of L.D. and Pat Tedford and little brother of JoAnn. Shortly after David's birth, his family returned to Magee, MS, where he grew up. David lived just across the railroad tracks from what was at that time the Mississippi State Tuberculosis Sanatorium and was a frequent visitor on the grounds. He played with the children in the Preventorium, went to movies at the Auditorium, and even played golf with Dr. Boswell. David's mother helped establish a Boy Scout Troop. Boy Scouts played a very important role in David's early years. At the time, he was the youngest boy ever to be named an Eagle Scout.

David was the envy of all the guys during his teenage years, with his good looks and fancy cars. He was elected Most Handsome at Magee High School and was also a star player for the Magee High School Trojans. David was also a NASCAR fan when nobody else would admit to it. David has continued to be a "Car Guy" and can tell you more about classic cars than you would ever care to know.

After graduating from the University of Southern Mississippi with various

business degrees, he returned to Magee to work with his family at the famous "Ted's Swap Shop." Thousands of people in the area can say they bought something for their home at the store. The business gave David an opportunity to help others in the community and around the state. As the vice-president of the region's Jaycees, he, along with Dr. Paul Cotten, helped establish the Jaycee Evaluation Center at Ellisville State School, which is still in operation.

David came to work at Boswell in 1985 as Director of Vocational Services. At the time, individuals were working on arts and crafts projects, but Dr. Paul Cotten, Director of Boswell at the time, wanted the individuals to be involved in "real work." Through a lot of hard work, both his own and that of his staff, David turned the vocational program into one of the most productive in the United States. David Tedford has a very good business head and good rapport with both private and public businesses. Companies now seek him out for contracts because of his long standing reputation for excellent work.

David Tedford still has an ongoing business relationship with Dr. Cotten. About every three months he



Some of the individuals from Boswell's Autism Services program and Wesson Group Home have become volunteers. Their first volunteer mission was to a local nursing home where they were introduced as "Boswell Volunteers." They passed out bingo cards and chips, making sure that everyone had their supplies. They also made sure that all who wanted coffee had sweeteners and cream along with napkins and stirrers.

An individual from the Autism Services program has found her place at St. Andrews Thrift Store. There she does activities such as straightening racks and sorting through plastic bags, making sure those with holes are discarded.

The volunteer work is not only helping those who receive the services, but it is also helping the individuals from Wesson Group Home and Autism Services become more socialized. Many people diagnosed with Autism have difficulty interacting socially with other people. Staff member Theresa Humphrey, who plans the volunteer trips, uses the community interactions as social learning opportunities. She noted she has seen improvement already with at least one volunteer who, out of her normal character, raised her head and gave a big, "Good Morning," to one of the directors at a volunteer location.

The volunteer work also happens to promote Goal 1 of the DMH Strategic Plan. This plan seeks to, "dispel stigma and increase mental health awareness." When people in the community have positive interactions with people who have a mental health diagnosis, the stigma, or social unacceptability, weakens.

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

Are you Ready? Mississippi Hurricane Preparedness

"The First 72 are on you!" means residents should have enough supplies to sustain their families for three days, 72 hours after a hurricane makes landfall. It could take that long for public assistance to reach you. Whether you live near the Gulf Coast or well inland you should review preparedness plans and be ready for the season.

Before the Hurricane Season

- ✓ Determine safe evacuation
- Learn locations of official shelters.
- Check emergency equipment, such as flashlights, generators and battery powered equipment such as cell phones and your NOAA Weather Radio All Hazards receiver.
- Buy food that will keep and store drinking water.
- Buy plywood or other material to protect your home if you don't already have it.
- Trim trees and shrubbery so branches don't fly into your home
- Clear clogged rain gutters and downspouts.
- Review your insurance policy.



EMERGENCY SUPPLY KIT

- Flashlight(s) with extra batteries
- Pet supplies (food, leash & carrier, vaccination records).
- Sanitary supplies.
- Toothbrush, toothpaste, soap, shampoo, cleanser, bleach, towelettes, toilet paper, trash bags, feminine hygiene products.
- Copies of important documents.
- Driver's license, SS card, proof of residence, insurance policies, wills, deeds, birth and marriage certificates, tax records, medical records, family pictures, etc.
- Cash, enough to fill up your vehicle with gas and travelers checks.
- Emergency generator.
- Portable radio with extra batteries.
- NOAA Weather Radio.
- Non-perishable food for at least 3 days.
- Bottled water (1 gallon per person per day).
- First Aid Kit with prescription medications.
- Bedding and clothing for each family member.
- Blankets and towels.
- Plastic dishes/eating utensils.
- Sun screen/sunglasses/mosquito repellant.
- Bicycle Helmet.



Take control of your health: Get tested for breast cancer.

Getting a yearly mammogram is one of the most important actions a woman can take to find breast cancer early when the disease is most treatable.

The American Cancer Society recommends the following for finding breast cancer early in women without symptoms:

- Mammogram: Women age 40 and older should have a mammogram every year and should keep on doing so for as long as they are in good health.
- Breast exam: Women in their 20s and 30s should have a breast exam as part of a regular exam by a doctor or nurse, at least every three years. After age 40, women should have a breast exam by a doctor or nurse every year.
- Be familiar with your breasts: And report any breast changes to your doctor without delay. Breast self-exam (BSE) is one way to be familiar with your breasts and find changes.










