Open House for the newly opened Boswell Regional Center's ID/DD Waiver Department in Magee, Mississippi, was on August 5, 2014. The purpose of the open house was to introduce the services that the Waiver provides to the community and to meet the ID/DD Waiver Support Coordinators.

3 Everyone enjoyed the fellowship with Boswell Regional Center's staff and visitors from the community. There were Support Coordinators available to answer 4 any questions, explaining the services that are available and how to access these 4 services. Boswell Regional Center is one of five state-operated comprehensive 5 IDD programs. The Waiver program provides supports and services that offer families an opportunity for their loved one to live in a community setting where 6 his/her dreams can become a reality. Below is a synopsis of Waiver services offered and the appropriate contacts to start the process of accessing community re-8 sources.

Mississippi's ID/DD Waiver provides individualized supports and services to 9 assist people in living successfully at home and in the community and are an alternative to care in institutional settings. The supports are funded by Medicaid. Services include: Supported Employment, Home and Community Supports, Supervised Living, Day Services-Adult, In-Home Nursing Respite, Community Respite, 1 ICF/IDD Respite, Prevocational Services, Specialized Medical Supplies, Crisis Support/Crisis Intervention Services, and Speech, Occupational and Physical 3 Therapy.



### Waiver Open House

Mrs. Belinda Arrington serves as Constituency Services Director, and Mrs. Cassandra Rankin serves as Director of ID/DD Waiver Services. Boswell Regional Center has eight Support Coordinators, Justin Britt (Magee), Cynthia Porter-Shaw (Magee), Yolanda Brown (Magee), Dr. Tori Gray (Magee), Janice Cockrell (Magee), Sopheria Carroll (Brookhaven), Dr. Barbara Buie (Brookhaven), and Carol Carter (Brookhaven). Trusie Eubanks is the Administrative Assistant, and Tara Blackwell is Electronic File Clerk through Boswell Regional Center's contract services.

The open house was a great time of fellowship and meeting new people. Over seventy-two (72) people signed the register at the ID/DD Waiver open house. There was also an arrangement made out of candy bars which was given away to the one that guessed the total amount of calories. Ms. Uneika Tillman-Funches Director of BRC Community Crisis Transition Homes

Uneika Tillman Funches is a native of Mendenhall, MS. She attended and graduated from Mendenhall High School where she excelled at basketball. After graduation, Uneika furthered her education at Copiah Lincoln Community College in Wesson, MS. While there, Uneika participated in athletics, having earned a basketball scholarship for her merits on the court. From here, Uneika transitioned to William Carey College in Hattiesburg, MS, to continue her academic work. While at WCC, Uneika earned her Bachelor of Science degree in Psychology. After graduating from William Carey, Uneika made the decision to further her education by completing a graduate degree. She accomplished this at Jackson State University where she received her Master of Science degree in Rehabilitation Counseling. Uneika has worked with the Mississippi Department

of Mental Health in a multitude of capacities for nearly fifteen years. During her time working for the state, her roles have included direct care worker, psychology technician, case manager, and behavior health specialist. She has been

responsible for the supervision and training of both new staff and interns of varying educational levels. At the present time, Uneika serves as the Director of the Boswell Regional Center Community Crisis Transition Homes program. In this role she supervises a team of workers tasked with the care of individuals seeking permanent program placement. She has served in this capacity for nearly one year. Uneika has earned her certification as a Mental Health Therapist. She is currently enrolled in the Certified Public Manager program with hopes of completing this certification within the next year. Away from work, Uneika participates in church activities and enjoys singing gospel music. She is married with two children.

## Pastor's Corner

One summer morning as Ray Blankenship was preparing his breakfast, he gazed out the window and saw a small girl being swept along in the rain-flooded drainage ditch beside his Andover, Ohio, home. Blankenship knew that farther downstream, the ditch disappeared with a roar underneath a road and then emptied into the main culvert. Ray dashed out the door and raced along the ditch, trying to get ahead of the floundering child. Then he hurled himself into the deep churning water. Blankenship surfaced and was able to grab the child's arm. They tumbled end over end. Within about three feet of the yawning culvert, Ray's free hand felt something--possibly a rock-- protruding from one bank. He clung desperately, but the tremendous force of the water tried to tear him and the child away. "If I can just hang on until help comes," he thought. He did better than that. By the time fire-department rescuers arrived, Blankenship had pulled the girl to safety. Both were treated for shock. On April 12, 1989, Ray Blankenship was awarded the Coast Guard's Silver Lifesaving Medal. The award is fitting, for this selfless person was at even greater risk to himself than most people knew. Ray Blankenship can't swim.

She enjoyed seeing the students in the classrooms and our education staff interacting with them. Ms Ogita was also shown TalkingTiles application that we are using in the classroom with the tablet computers and some of the programs that we utilize.

### Heart Attack Signs in Women

- . Uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain in the center of your chest. It lasts more than a few minutes, or goes away and comes back.
- . Pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or stomach.
- . Shortness of breath with or without chest discomfort.
- . Other signs such as breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness.
- . As with men, women's most common heart attack symptom is chest pain or discomfort. But women are somewhat more likely than men to experience some of the other common symptoms, particularly shortness of breath, nausea/vomiting and back or jaw pain.
