Rutledge Appointed to Board of Mental Health



Stewart Rutledge of Oxford has been appointed to the Mississippi Board of Mental Health by Governor Phil Bryant. Mr. Rutledge is a real estate developer who will serve as the citizen representative for the First Congressional District for a seven-year term beginning July 1.

Mr. Rutledge earned a bachelor's degree in physics, summa cum laude, from the University of Mississippi, enrolled in the University of Mississippi Medical School, but instead decided to attend the University of Mississippi Law School, from which he also graduated with honors. Mr. Rutledge is also a family member of a person who receives mental health services.

Mr. Rutledge was previously appointed by Governor Haley Barbour to serve as Chairman of the Mississippi Juvenile Justice Advisory Committee, and he served on the Mississippi Supreme Court's Commission on Juveniles, both of which aimed to ensure proper treatment of juveniles coming into contact with the judicial system. Mr. Rutledge also served as Mississippi's representative on the

Federal Advisory Committee on Juvenile Justice in Washington, D.C.

Additionally, Secretary of State Hosemann selected Mr. Rutledge to serve in an advisory capacity on a committee exploring Mississippi's business laws and their relationship to emerging technology. Mr. Rutledge served as Board Member and General Counsel for the Mississippi Freedom 50th, advising Congressman Bennie Thompson and Justice Reuben Anderson in efforts to commemorate the 50th Anniversary of the Freedom Riders.

Prior to his work as a real estate developer, Mr. Rutledge served as Corporate Counsel to Sta-Home Healthcare, Mississippi's largest Home Health provider. Although he maintains his law license, Mr. Rutledge's primary work now is in real estate development, with a focus on developing affordable housing. Mr. Rutledge's company has developed numerous communities across several states, and two of his communities in Mississippi were recently awarded as the best affordable housing communities in the nation in consecutive years.

Mr. Rutledge has had numerous works on a variety of subjects published in newspapers, magazines, and law journals. He has a wife and two young boys, one and two, and they reside in Oxford.

The governing board of the Mississippi Department of Mental Health, the Board of Mental Health is composed of nine members appointed by the governor of Mississippi and confirmed by the state Senate. Members' terms are staggered to ensure continuity of quality care and professional oversight of services. By statute, the nine-member board is composed of a physician, a psychiatrist, a clinical psychologist, a social worker with experience in the field of mental health, and one citizen representative from each of Mississippi's five congressional districts (as existed in 1974).



Sassy Glass Visit













Co-Lin Nurses Visit BRC

Safety and Security

Gaming Online Safely and Securely

Online games are a great way to have fun; however it also comes with its own set of unique risks. Fortunately there are ways to protect yourself and your family when gaming online.

One of the advantages of online gaming is that you can play and talk with others from all around the world and, usually, you won't even know the people you are playing with. While the vast majority of them are online to have fun just like you, there are those who want to cause harm. Here are some steps you should take to stay secure:

- Be cautious of any messages that ask you to take an action, such as clicking on a link or downloading a file. Just like email phishing attacks, the bad guys will attempt to trick you or otherwise convince you to take actions that can infect your computer or steal your identity. If a message seems odd, urgent or too good to be true, be suspicious that it may be an attack.
- Many online games have their own financial markets where you can buy, trade or barter virtual goods. Just
 like in the real world there are people who will attempt to steal your money, whether virtual or actual.
 Deal only with people who have established, trusted reputations.
- Use strong passwords always. This prevents an attacker from simply guessing your password and taking
 over your account. If your game offers two-step authentication, use it. In addition, don't use the same
 password for different accounts. That way, if one game is compromised, your other accounts are safe. If
 you can't remember all your passwords, consider getting a password manager; there are several good ones
 out there that are free to use.
- Be sure your computer is always running the latest version of the operating system and the gaming software. By keeping these updated you eliminate most of the known vulnerabilities.
- Use anti-virus software always and make sure it is both up-to-date and checking files you run in real time.
- Download gaming software only from trusted sites. Often cyber criminals will create a fake or infected version of the game and distribute it from their own server. Gaming add-on packs can also be infected with malware, so be sure they come only from trusted sites as well and avoid using any add-on that asks you to disable your anti-virus or make changes to your security settings. The same goes for cheat software or websites they can harbor malware.

The key is to use strong passwords, protect your computer and exercise common sense, especially with odd requests.
