First of all, I'd like to thank the staff at Goodwater Meadows Group Home for their quick action in making sure the residents there were in a safe place when the tornado struck in the wee hours of the morning of Thursday, March 26th. Goodwater suffered substantial damage, but due to staff heeding the tornado siren warning, there were no injuries. We also experienced minor damage at State Farm. We feel so fortunate and blessed this was the only damage Boswell buildings sustained. However, we do have significant damage to our timber.

Over 101 acres were affected and on the advise of the Forestry Department, much of it has been logged.

Individuals that were living at Goodwater are now residing at Pineview on campus. They seem to be adjusting well in their temporary home.

We have the final drawings and plans from the architect on the buildings that will be built to house individuals that are currently living in the Jaquith building. Four ICF/MR buildings are slated to be built. This will allow individuals to live two to a room and will place everyone at ground level. This will help everyone, especially our individuals that have mobility issues.

This is an exciting time at Boswell Regional Center and we are looking forward to all the positive changes that are being made at our facility to help us better serve the individuals in our care.

Celebrating IDD Awareness 'Just like you'

Each year March is designated as Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (IDD) Month in Mississippi in an effort to educate area citizens and to create an awareness in local communities regarding individuals diagnosed with a disability.

Boswell Regional Center serves individuals 21 and older who have been diagnosed with intellectual or other developmental disabilities.

The facility first opened in 1976 and started out by serving 35 adult individuals diagnosed with an intellectual or developmental disability. Today the number has grown to serve approximately 690 with some of those individuals living on campus, many in various apartments, a number in group homes, and individuals who receive services right in their own home.

This past year, Boswell made a more visible appearance in Magee with the occupancy of a building in the heart of the town, located across from the post office. This space houses many of the facility's community programs including the offices for Community IDD (Intellectually and Developmentally Disabled) Programs, Home and Community Based Support offices, and the Diagnostics and Evaluation Department.



Individuals respond to Pet Therapy

Several staff members at Boswell Regional Center thought Pet Therapy would be beneficial to individuals.

So after some investigating, Boswell was able to find someone locally to address this need.

That "someone" is Al Gordy of Magee. Together with his dog, Smooch, Gordy visits Boswell about once a month.

Smooch isn't just any dog; he's a labradoodle. No, it's not a made up name. He's a cross between a Labrador and a poodle. But more than that he's a trained Therapy Dog.

"He has more degrees than I do," Gordy recently said.

And this dog rightfully earns the name Smooch. Gordy demonstrates this by calling to him while opening his arms wide. In response, Smooch runs into the waiting arms and gives Gordy a big kiss.

Smooch has been to Boswell several times now and has been a big hit with the individuals.

The pair has visited the Prime Timers program, which consists of older individuals: Morton Group Home that houses individuals diagnosed with autism; and a num-

MR building on campus.

April 2008. The building will house the Community DD Program's Pre-Vocational Workshop and the Day Habilitation Program. Funding for the renovations and necessary equipment for the 13,664 square foot building is generated from the on-campus Vocational Services program.

"In the past 32 years, as we've continued to grow we've watched the city of Magee grow. We are fortunate that the city fathers and the citizens of Magee support us in our efforts to continue to work toward more community-based services," Raymond Johnson, facility director, said. "We, in turn, support the town, its citizens, the Chamber, businesses and community activities that make Magee a great place to be located."

BRC Director Raymond Johnson recently said after observing a Pet Therapy session, "It's a delightful scene to witness. The response from the individuals to Smooth has been very positive, and we plan to continue the program. We are very grateful to Mr. Gordy for taking time out of his busy schedule to come to Boswell to bring this program which has provided so much joy to the individuals."

Gordy and Smooch travel to other facilities on a regular basis, including MS State Hospital.

banking and going to local medical professionals for their needs. Not to mention the number of employees who live in and around Magee who pay city and county taxes.


