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Sidewalk and Bridge Project enhances BRC

Boswell Regional Center is a very beautiful campus and it is common to see individuals and staff alike walking from building to building and place to place. Recently, with the help of the DFA, Bureau of Buildings and Grounds, we received funding to build new ADA compliant sidewalks and a bridge. While the new construction has added aesthetically to the campus, it has also made it safer and easier for our individuals to walk from place to place. According to Craig Kittrell, Maintenance Director,

"sidewalks are one of the most common pieces of transportation infrastructure, yet if not accessible, they can pose great challenges and danger to anyone in a wheelchair or with crutches." The ADA standards that have been incorporated into the newly constructed sidewalks have made it easier for client use. The sidewalks are six feet in width, meet slope requirements with the use of ramps, and have a detectable warning device before intersections.

The wellness committee for BRC recommended that the sidewalks have mile markers placed into the cement every onetenth of a mile. The markers will enable our individuals and staff to record how far they have walked. The sidewalks have helped to create a safe and healthier environment. After all, walking is a low cost way to support regular, physical activity to assist in decreasing the risk of chronic health conditions in both our individuals and employees.



"The new ADA compliant bridge and sidewalks at BRC are a tremendous hit with the individuals. Organization Award for Energy Efficiency/Management

Boswell Regional Center believes in being a good steward of the State of Mississippi's funding for our facility. That is why our maintenance director, Mr. Craig Kittrell began a project to help assist in not only saving money on our electricity bill, but also to assist in reaching the global environmental targets and reduce our carbon footprint.

As part of the Federal ARRA funding, energy auditing and retro-commissioning were performed on the main campus. The appraisal was performed to search for ways to increase energy efficiency, reduce energy costs and to ensure that all systems were functioning properly and efficiently. Inspections included baseline energy modeling and functional testing of chillers, boilers, air handling units, fan coil units, split DX systems and lighting. As a result of the analysis and audit, BRC was presented with the (ARRA) Energy Conservation Measures Award by the Mississippi Development Authority Energy Division and the Mississippi Department of Finance and Administration Bureau of Building, Grounds and Real Property. Throughout the year, BRC also performs an array of in house energy measures. Many thanks go to Craig for his hard work and dedication to this facility. Congratulations Craig and BRC!

Not much was known about Autism 67 years ago, so Donald's parents were looking for answers to their child's unknown disorder. That is one reason they placed him in the preventorium. When John and Caryn discovered that Donald spent a year here when he was three, Mr. Donvan contacted BRC and asked if he could visit the campus. He wanted to get a feel of where Donald was housed.

The two authors visited the campus and were guided on a tour by Vocational Services Director, David Tedford, and Human Resources Director, Suzie Wilder. Both authors were very impressed by Mr. Tedford's vast knowledge of the grounds and of the preventorium. You see, David grew up right next to the grounds and had many stories to tell about the children of the San, as he referred to them. Mr. Donvan and Ms. Zucker were thrilled with the knowledge that they attained when they made their visit.



John Donvan is a correspondent for ABC News "Nightline" based in Washington D.C., and was an occasional substitute for former anchor Ted Koppel. Caren Zucker is a television producer and the mother of a teenager with autism. Along with John Donvan, she has been collecting forgotten stories of autism for a book.

Boswell Regional Center is on the Heritage Trail

Through a project developed by the Simpson County Development Association the grounds of what used to be known as Sanatorium, Mississippi are placed on the Heritage Trail. Each stop along the trail is of historic significance to Simpson County, showcasing points of interest and facts about the origins of the county.

The trail will follow old highway 49 through the county with stops along the trail at sites in Braxton, D'Lo, Mendenhall, Weathersby, Harrisville, Pinola/Westville, Sanatorium, and Magee. Each site will have a permanent, weatherproof sign detailing the community, historical, and cultural events. Magee, as the southern terminus, and Braxton as the northern, will have additional information about the trail.

BRC is proud to be a part of this trail and we look forward to citizens and tourists learning about the historic significance of what used to be known as Sanatorium, Mississippi.

The next time your out and about and have some time to experience the history of our county, I suggest that each of you take the opportunity to visit the Heritage Trail.



Sanatorium Museum

Boswell Regional Center has a rich history that will be shared with the community through a museum. Currently, with the assistance of Richard Rankin, we are working on putting the museum together by indexing and referencing each item of memorabilia that will be placed in the museum. The items that will be showcased are photographs, artifacts, and memorabilia from the preventorium and the tuberculosis hospital. The hospital was in operation from 1918 until 1976, when it was turned over to the Mississippi Department of Mental Health and became known as Boswell Retardation Center. The name was later changed to Boswell Regional Center.

Mr. Rankin is working diligently to get the museum up and running. It is also going to be of major significance because the museum will be visited by persons on the heritage trail. Stay tuned for the grand opening!
